We're Plugging into your Future

Choptank Electric recently unveiled at its Annual Meeting a new addition to our vehicle fleet: a 2018 Chevrolet Bolt.

This all-electric vehicle (EV) offers an EPA-estimated 238 miles of range on a single charge, which makes it perfect for driving distances throughout the Eastern Shore. When compared to the Chevrolet Cruze, which gets an average 35 MPG and costs \$41.00 for a fill up at the pump, the Bolt gets an average 119 MPGE (Equivalent) and costs \$1.35 a "fill up" at electricity costs of 15 cents per kWh.

In addition to the long term cost savings of the Bolt, the Coop wanted to get a first-hand education of what our members are experiencing as they are starting to purchase EV's throughout the Shore. The Cooperative is preparing for the system impacts of the additional load brought on by EV home charging. Down the road there is even talk of using and paying our members for the electricity stored in the EV batteries.

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The students toured Capitol Hill and met with U.S. Rep. Andy Harris and aides of U.S. Senator Ben Cardin and U.S. Senator Chris Van Hollen. They also visited historical and cultural sites around the nation's capital, including the Newseum, Arlington National Cemetery, and Fort McHenry.



Among fun activities the students enjoyed were a twilight cruise on the Potomac, a Baltimore Orioles baseball game, a live performance of "The Scottsboro Boys," and a visit to the National Aquarium.

As part of NRECA-sponsored National Youth Day on June 11, all of the state groups convened to learn from inspirational speakers. This year's agenda included Mike Schlappi, a four-time Paralympic Medalist



and two-time world champion in wheelchair basketball, who shared his inspiring message, "Just because you can't stand up, doesn't mean you can't stand out!"

Since 1964, cooperatives from all across the country have

sponsored more than 70,000 high school juniors and seniors to visit their U.S. congressional delegations, learn about their nation's history, and sight see in Washington, D.C.

"Youth Tour was amazing," said Brandon Foy, who was chosen to represent Maryland as part of NRECA's Youth Leadership Council. "It was so educational and helpful meeting with our elected officials and learning about how politics work. We made new friends from all across the country that will last a lifetime, and I will never forget this great experience. Choptank Electric is helping me achieve my goals and I am so grateful for this opportunity."



"The Co-op is proud that it can invest time and money into the local youth and their futures," said Beth Gertsch, Manager of Marketing, Communications, and Member Engagement who served as one of the students' chaperones. "To keep communities strong, we need to make that commitment our youth."

Bolt

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

We will also assist you if you have questions about the electrical needs for your home charger. At Choptank Electric we keep the Bolt charged by plugging it into an available 240-volt/32-amp charging unit. When we are done for the day we plug it in and it's ready to go by the next morning even if it's been fully depleted. Renewable Energy without the Hassle

Are you interested in renewable energy but can't put a solar array or a wind turbine on your property? We have the answer! Choptank Electric offers Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) for anyone who is interested in purchasing renewable energy without the hassle.

Since 2009, Choptank Electric has offered RECs for anyone interested in reducing their carbon footprint and supporting green power. Co-op members may purchase this green power in blocks of 100 kWh that costs 20 cents per block. For example, to

purchase four blocks of green energy, or 400 kWh, that means it will cost the member 80 cents. This charge will appear as an additional line item on your monthly bill.

While there is a minimum purchase of one block, there is no maximum. This purchase requires a one-year commitment and this purchase will automatically renew unless cancelled.

2017 Capital Credit Allocation

Choptank Electric Cooperative is a non-profit member-owned utility. Any margins (profits) above the cost of service are allocated back to our member/owners based on how much electricity each member purchased during the year.

This allocation is done after the final 2017 financial statements have been reviewed and audited. The 2017 Capital Credit Allocation was processed in July 2018. As in past years, the 2017 capital credit allocation notice for active members will be shown on the August 2018 electric bill in the left message area above the bill stub. Inactive members with 2017 electricity billings will be mailed a separate allocation notice.

The capital credits (margins) allocated to members' accounts for 2017 totals \$15,770,614. This is divided between allocations for Choptank Electric

(Co-op), which totals \$13,242,574, and Old Dominion Electric Cooperative (ODEC), Choptank's energy supplier, which totals \$2,528,040.

The Choptank Electric Board of Directors reviews the Co-op portion of capital credits each year and decides how and when to repay the amounts allocated. Their decision is based on a variety of factors including the overall financial condition of the Cooperative. Any decision to repay the ODEC portion of capital credits would be entirely contingent upon refunds received from Choptank's energy supplier.
